Three CAFOD volunteers came to school on 15th January 2024 and worked with each class individually. The focus was upon everybody being responsible for making the world a better place. The children thoroughly enjoyed the workshops and came away with many actions to help where they can.

The Mini Vinnies and School Council were also inspired to lead The BIG Lent Walk (more information about this later).

LIVERPOOL SCHOOLS' PARLIAMENT VISIT

We want the children within St Vincent's to have a direct and authentic involvement in making the decisions that affect them. This year we have been delighted to join the series Liverpool's Schools' Parliament events, where our children meet with other school representatives and discuss important themes that have or will inevitably impact them. These are themes that have already been identified via the 2023 Oxwell Children's Survey. Our Head



boy, Head girl and other representatives for our Year 6 had the marvelous opportunity to visit the Town Hall join the discussions. The 4 sessions focus on:

- 1. Children's priorities in Education.
- 2. Your Mental Health Matters.
- 3. Where do you find belonging?
- 4. Decided by Schools' Parliament.

The Liverpool Schools' Parliament is a fantastic opportunity for our children to be part of an inclusive and fair environment where all students are represented. Also to enable them to learn how to effectively communicate the opinions of themselves and others. The role of the group is to be the link for our school and to feedback to school council and Senior Leaders. The children are thoroughly enjoying these opportunities where they are firsthand experiencing politics in action, having their voices heard, helping to inform decisions, and learning more about democracy. Mrs. Foy (RE lead) has led workshops for parents/carers around the content of RSHE this term. On 23rd January 2024, a workshop was held for Rec to Year 4 parents/carers. On 30th

January 2024, a second workshop was held for Years 5 and 6 parents/carers. All content is posted upon our school website for families to refer to if necessary. Families were all given the right to withdraw their child(ren) from the sessions. Once this was complete, each class teacher taught the three planned 'Journey in Love' sessions to their class.

A Journey in Love is a resource created by Sister Jude Groden. It is the recommended programme for Catholic schools for Sex and Relationship Education and has been written as a progressive scheme of work that supports the Religious Education, PSHE and Science curricular taught within the school.

Central to our work within the school is learning about our faith, understanding ourselves, our position in the community and how we develop as human beings – our spiritual, social, emotional and physical development. This is how A Journey in Love fits into the school's curriculum. The scheme permeates through all levels of learning throughout the school. It focuses on friendship, family, community, relationships and spirituality.

LENTEN SERVICE





have been to their launch days and have begun to trial the new curriculum and the new way of planning. The Liverpool Archdiocese are being instrumental in leading the year group launches. This involves the class teacher joining an extensive group of practitioners (in the same year group) to discuss how to plan, what to plan and resources to support. The RE Lead then supports the teacher's implementation in school to ensure that everybody is supported and



to ensure that everyone is following a consistent approach.



Summer term 1 will see the launch of Year 2's planning and teaching and learning taking place, with the Year 3 launch shortly after this. The remaining year groups, 4, 5 and 6, will embark on this journey in the new academic year, 2024/2025.

CHILDREN'S MENTAL HEALTH WEEK

In February, we started Children's Mental Health Week with the theme of 'My Voice Matters'. The focus was upon validating feelings and being able to speak about how you feel. 'Daily Express' sessions were held virtually throughout the week for our KS1 and KS2 children. The focus this year was providing children with the tools they need to express themselves. When we feel empowered, there's a positive impact on our well-being. Children who feel their voices are heard and can make a difference have a greater sense of community and self-esteem. We want children of all ages, backgrounds, and abilities to be empowered to work together to create a positive change for their mental health and well-being.





INTERNET SAFETY DAY

Internet safety is a top priority for our school to ensure our children stay safe and are responsible online.

With this in mind, we started the day with an E-Safety Safeguarding Whole School Assembly - the children were keen to show their knowledge on how to keep safe. Then each class spent Internet Safety Day learning about a different aspect of staying safe online, using the excellent Project Evolve resources. KS1 discovered the importance of secure passwords and never sharing personal information online. LKS2 learnt about how to safely use a search engine, voice activated searching and how the internet can be used to buy and sell things, with a focus on in-app purchases and influencers. UKS2 investigated online advertising, how to spot a bot and how information online isn't always true, why it is important to make our own

opinion about content online and searching social media channels for information. The Year 5 and 6 children also began completing the Safe Skills survey, to support us in understanding their use and knowledge of the internet and how the school can further support our children as they get ready to progress to High School.

To continue to support our parents we were delighted to post on our Dojo site the first of our monthly Online Safety Newsletters in January, we have been delighted with the feedback from parents around this. Also, we were able to organise on Wednesday 31st January an 'Online Safety Information Session' which highlighted current trends, understanding the risks, what can you do? and further support services. The added benefit from this session was you could simply register and if you were not able to make it the recording it was subsequently shared, so parents were able to watch it back at a time convenient to you. We really hope this is another way to continue to support and update parents/carers about the important subject of Online Safety, so we ensure we keep our children safe!



ONLINE SAFETY NOTIFICATION FOR PARENTS



We will be holding a PARENTAL ONLINE SAFETY MEETING just before our KS2 Golden Assembly Tuesday 26th April 2pm. In this meeting our IT provider MGL will update and support parents around the parental control app 'Qustodio' which supports you in protecting your child from inappropriate content.

It can be tough to keep up with digital trends as a busy parent, so they will be there to help with that too. Their research-backed knowledge and advice makes it easier for parents/carers to navigate the digital world with your children.

SEND ME A SELFIE

As a continued focus on Online Safety we have been delighted to work with Ariel Trust and Liverpool John Moores University this year to access face to face workshops (led by Ariel Trust Forum Theatre Practitioners) focusing on a 'Send Me a Selfie Whole Community Approach'.

Year 5 have taken part in this exciting new PSHE module focused on sharing images online and the repercussions online decisions can have on an individual. The lessons have allowed the children to focus



on the pressure they might feel to share images and the consequences if they do. The children also discussed how to talk to trusted adults about problems they face online and how keeping secrets about online behaviour can be dangerous. The class have used a range of strategies such as discussion, forum theatre and videos to support their learning, all designed to enable pupils to rehearse positive communication strategies. The children showed great maturity throughout the topic and were were inquisitive about the topic. We are also excited to deliver a parental workshop in our Summer Term to further support our parents – more information will follow on our school Dojo platform.

NSPCC NATIONAL NUMBER DAY

IT'S MATHS, BUT NOT AS WE KNOW IT.

This year's World Book Day took place on Thursday 7th March and launched our Reading Month at St Vincent de Paul.


We have lots of fun activities planned in school for this month and it was lovely to see the children take part in the dressing up and the staff too!

Early Music as Education (EMAE) is a registered charity based in Liverpool that promotes the cultural, social, and economic value of Early Music through regular educational, recreational, and scholarly activities. Its mission is to: 1) educate music students; 2) train professional musicians; 3) reach out to new audiences; 4) promote musical research. In the long term and against all odds, EMAE aims to fill the increasingly wider gap in the public funding of music education and support many children to access musical training. From the outset, the overall learning objective has been to develop the children's self- and musical awareness through motor, perceptual, temporal, and spatial teaching activities, exercises, and games. SCIENCE WEEK



From Friday 8th March to Sunday 17th March, it was National Science Week the theme was TIME. We have been celebrating all things Science, conducting experiments, learning about famous scientists and embarking on an epic whole school competition.

EYFS have been learning about what a seed needs to grow and the life cycle of a butterfly. They have thoroughly enjoyed the new addition to their Science Investigation area- a curiosity cube! The children are currently trying to predict what might grow in their cube.

KS1 and KS2 have been learning about the famous scientist, Charles Darwin. We have been looking at his life and how his theories changed the scientific world. Each year group was tasked with learning about different stages of Darwin's life. We also learnt about and

discussed Darwin's Theory of Evolution through natural selection recognising it is a process of changes in a species over time to suit their environment. We have created a whole school display about what we found out.

We have also launched a whole school competition, on which class can grow the biggest sunflower! All class were given a sunflower seed, soil, pot and detailed instructions... I wonder who the winner will be? The winners will be announced in the summer term and award the Sunflower Trophy! Watch this space for updates!

MINI VINNIES UPDATE FROM MRS COTTER

This term Mini Vinnies have certainly put their faith into action! We have continued to work together to develop our school allotment. We have been busy planting, painting and digging! Our biggest project has been designing and creating the school pond. The children have been busy excavating the area and getting the ground ready for the pond liner. We can't wait to welcome the wildlife and frog friends into the 'Vinnies Pond'.

The children have continued to support each other to achieve their shared goal of having the best school allotment! Along with Year 4, the Mini Vinnies have also been busy sowing seeds for the upcoming season. Miss Pia, the resident gardener, has been helping the children understand how seeds grow and what they need to flourish. They have planted up a storm including peas, leeks, tomatoes, potatoes, garlic, cornflowers and marshmallow seeds. We are looking forward to a bountiful harvest in the summer term.

Mini Vinnies have also been sharing their 'Water Stories' with Rachel Hardy from Roots in the City Community Garden. Rachel came into school and invited the children to be part of a new project in the community garden along with raising awareness on the importance of water in our daily lives. The children came up with some fantastic ideas as to how we use water, and they understood the importance of water and how we should value and conserve water.

The Mini Vinnies were invited along to commemorate 180 years of St. Vincent de Paul at the Metropolitan Catholic Cathedral. It was a lovely event and a reminder that, as Mini Vinnies, we play an important role in SVP community empowering our community through compassion, care and action!

We have also been successful in winning the OVO FOUNDATION NATURE PRIZE 2024 for bringing children closer to nature and improving biodiversity. A huge well done to all involved!

MOMENTS MATTER, ATTENDANCE COUNTS


'Make a good start to earn a new part!'
