Holy Communicants visit to Blessed Carlo Acutis exhibition and St Edmund Arrowsmiths Holy Hand



Our Year 4 First Holy Communicants enjoyed a special visit to St. Oswald and St. Edmund Arrowsmith Church in Ashton-in-Makerfield with myself on 29th April 2025. Here, we were warmly welcomed by Rev Canon John Gorman, who spoke about the life of St Edmund Arrowsmith and the importance of staying strong in faith. He shared the story of the Holy Hand - the preserved hand of the saint - which reminds us of his bravery in standing up for his beliefs, even when it was difficult. The children were blessed with the Holy Hand, making the moment extra special and memorable. They also explored the inspiring Carlo Acutis exhibition on Eucharistic Miracles, learning how this young boy used technology to help others grow closer to Jesus. Carlo famously said that "the Eucharist is our highway to heaven", helping the children understand the importance of recognising that Jesus is truly present in the Eucharist. The visit ended with a quiet time of prayer at the newly developed Our Lady shrine. The Missionaries of Charity Sisters accompanied the group, offering additional support and guidance throughout this meaningful and faith-filled experience.

Year 4 First Holy Communion Celebration





We were delighted to celebrate such a special occasion with our Holy Communicants from Year 4 this term as they received their First Holy Communion. The day began beautifully with a reverent and joyful Mass led by Fr Terry, where the children showed such pride and devotion as they received the Eucharist for the first time.

EYFS 'LEARNING ABOUT FAITH'



- Fr Moses visited Nursery to share some scripture with the children, explaining how Jesus loves everyone all over the world and answering their thoughtful questions.
- We also welcomed Miss Bammer (Year 2), who shared aspects of her Islamic faith. She brought some beautiful artefacts, including her prayer mat, and read a short passage from the Qur'an. She also talked with the children about the similarities and differences between Islam and Christianity, encouraging respect and understanding.

We were delighted to see our younger children take part in the Pilgrims of Hope Mass at the Metropolitan Cathedral. They sang the hymns they had been practising so beautifully and read with confidence during the readings — a truly moving moment for all who attended. The theme of being Pilgrims of Hope gave the children a chance to reflect on their own journey of faith, learning that even at a young age they can bring hope, kindness, and joy to others through their words and actions. Taking part in this special Mass helped them feel connected to the wider Catholic community and reminded them that they are part of God's loving family, always walking together in faith and hope.

LIVING OUR GOSPEL VALUES ON TRANSITION DAY

As part of our whole-school Transition Day — when children spent time with their new class teachers and began looking forward to the year ahead — we also took the opportunity to celebrate our Gospel Values.

Each class explored one of the core Gospel values that shape our school community:

Love, Wisdom, Hope, Respect, Fairness, Fellowship, Service, and Courage.

The children reflected on what their class's value means in everyday life and how we can live it out in our school, at home, and in the wider world. They took part in thoughtful discussions, creative activities, and shared their ideas about how these values help us follow our mission:

It was wonderful to see every child so engaged and enthusiastic, discovering how being active can be both healthy and fun. A huge thank you to the Kings Camps team for delivering such a positive, memorable experience and helping to inspire our pupils to lead more active lifestyles.

THE IMPACT OF OUR FOREST SCHOOL AREA

This year, we are proud to reflect on the incredible impact that our investment in Forest School training has had on the whole school community. From its creation, this outdoor space was designed to give every child the opportunity to explore, learn, and grow in nature — and it has truly become a much-loved part of school life.

A key part of making Forest School a success was investing in our staff. We are delighted that 10 members of staff have now trained as Forest School Leads, giving us a highly skilled and enthusiastic team who can safely and confidently deliver high-quality sessions for all year groups. This training has allowed us to embed Forest School into our provision in a meaningful and sustainable way.

Over the year, every year group has accessed the Forest School area, from our youngest children in Reception to our oldest in Year 6. The space has been used for a wide range of activities designed to develop confidence, teamwork, resilience, and respect for nature.

Some of the highlights include:

- Building dens and shelters using natural materials.
- Learning how to safely light and manage a fire in the dedicated fire pit area, and even toasting marshmallows!
- Using tools and developing practical outdoor skills under close supervision.
- Nature-based art and craft activities, inspired by the seasons.
- Mindfulness and quiet reflection, helping children to develop a sense of peace and well-being.

We have further enhanced this provision by inviting other professionals into school to lead and inspire both staff and children in our Forest School area. We were delighted to welcome Mrs Cameron, Senior Lecturer from Liverpool John Moores University, who shared her expertise and passion for outdoor learning. We also had a fantastic visit from Mr Rowe, a specialist outdoor teacher, who brought new ideas and activities to engage the children. You can read more about his inspiring visit on the next page.

The benefits for our children have been evident:

- Improved confidence and independence, especially for those who find the classroom challenging.
- Opportunities to develop teamwork and communication skills.
- A deeper appreciation of the natural world and the importance of caring for our environment.
- Enhanced emotional well-being, with many children describing Forest School as their "favourite part of the week."

We are thrilled that this provision has been embraced so wholeheartedly by children and staff alike, and we look forward to continuing to develop our Forest School programme in the years to come. We would like to thank our Forest School Leads, visiting professionals, and everyone involved in making

this vision a reality.

This term we were thrilled to welcome Mr Rowe, a forest school and mountaineering expert — and Miss Rowe's older brother — who works as an outdoor lead at a school in Yorkshire. He spent the day delivering exciting forest school sessions to classes across the school.

Children in Years 2, 5 and 6 learned how to filter water using simple, everyday household items — a handy survival skill — and discussed how to stay safe near water as we head into the summer holidays. The children also got the chance to explore a range of climbing equipment, from helmets and harnesses to outdoor rucksacks, and even try some of it on. It was a fantastic, hands-on experience that inspired the children to enjoy and respect the great outdoors!

Mr Rowe said how much he enjoyed working with our pupils and hopes to return in the future to deliver even more outdoor adventures.





🌟 KEY STAGE 2 PALM OIL PROJECT WITH CHESTER ZOO: A WILD SUCCESS! 🧺

We are proud to share the success of our Key Stage 2 Sustainable Palm Oil Challenge, a fantastic conservation project run in partnership with Chester Zoo.

Earlier this year, our school was specially invited by Jenny, a Conservation Education Officer from Chester Zoo, to take part in one of their limited and highly regarded outreach programmes. We were thrilled to accept and chose the Sustainable Palm Oil Challenge, which focused on the impact of palm oil production on rainforests and wildlife — and how small, informed choices can help protect these precious habitats.

The project began with a staff kickstarter meeting to help embed the topic across the curriculum. Then, over three days, Chester Zoo's Conservation Education Officers delivered interactive, thought-provoking workshops to all of our Year 3–6 classes. The sessions sparked meaningful discussions and gave our KS2 children a deeper understanding of how our everyday decisions affect the wider world.

The highlight of the project was an exciting visit to Chester Zoo, where our Year 3-6 children were able to see conservation in action, explore the rainforest habitats, and take part in activities linked to the palm oil challenge. One activity focused on how hornbills cleverly build their nests and why protecting their habitats is so important. Afterwards, the children explored the zoo and marvelled at the incredible wildlife, spotting tigers, elephants, giraffes, flamingos — and even venturing into the butterfly house and the bat cave! It was a truly memorable and inspiring experience, bringing their learning to life and showing them how their actions can make a real difference.

We feel privileged to have been one of only a small number of schools chosen to take part in this initiative. The Sustainable Palm Oil Challenge has strengthened our commitment to the CAFOD Live Simply Award, encouraging us all to live simply, sustainably, and in solidarity with others.

A huge well done to our Key Stage 2 children for their engagement, teamwork and thoughtful contributions throughout the project — you really are making a difference for our planet and its wildlife!



We had an incredible Eco Week, held from Monday 19th to Friday 23rd May 2025, as part of the Liverpool Schools Parliament — "Liverpool Children Unite to Make a Difference for Our City and Our Planet."

The week was a truly inspiring celebration of how we can all care for our common home, and it was amazing to see the creativity, enthusiasm and teamwork of our children as they worked on their eco projects. Our visitors were so impressed by the children's knowledge, passion and the positive message they shared — a real credit to the whole school community and a shining example of how we are living out the values of the CAFOD Live Simply Award.

We were honoured to welcome a team of visitors from Liverpool City Council, led by Caroline O'Neill, Families Programme Manager and Child Friendly City Coordinator. Joining her were colleagues Caroline Scott, Sian McCosh, and Barney Konneh, who came to observe and celebrate the children's fantastic work and activities. In the run-up to Eco Week, the team got in touch to say:

"Thank you for sharing your plans for Eco Week at your school. They really stood out and we would love to visit and capture the children's work to incorporate into our celebrations."

Their kind words and enthusiasm were a testament to how amazing our school community is and how hard Mrs Cotter had worked to plan such an impactful week - we were delighted to invite them into St Vincent's!

Mrs Cotter launched the week with a whole-school assembly on Monday afternoon, setting the scene and challenging each class with a special eco task to complete. On Wednesday, the school was a sea of green as children and staff dressed in green to show their support for the planet while completing their tasks. It was a fantastic day for teamwork, learning and plenty of photo opportunities! Here's what each class achieved:

- ightharpoons EYFS & Year 6 Litter picked around the school grounds, leaving the area clean and tidy
- *Year 1 Built wonderful bug houses for Forest School, creating homes for wildlife
- *Year 2 Revitalised the mud kitchen with fresh soil, herbs and organisation
- 🌻 Year 3 Litter picked and planted around the school grounds
- 隊 Year 4 Took responsibility for litter picking around the school perimeter
- Year 5 Made and hung bird feeders and installed solitary bee houses
- 4 Year 6 Created fantastic posters and videos encouraging recycling, which will now be displayed in school and around the local area

We also launched a whole-school home challenge, encouraging families to create junk art from recyclable materials — the creativity and effort put into these projects were wonderful to see.

Meanwhile, our Mini Vinnies began an exciting new mission that will continue into next year. As part of a joint project with the local council, they visited and carried out a planning session for repurposing a neglected green space on Argyle Street, which is currently used as a waste area. This first site visit and discussion marked the start of what promises to be a truly transformative project — and a powerful example of living out the values of the CAFOD Live Simply Award, by caring for our local environment and working in solidarity with our community. We look forward to seeing their plans come to life next year!

Eco Week was a powerful reminder that together we can make a real difference — and it was clear to all our visitors how much our children care about making our world a better place. Thank you to everyone — staff, families, pupils and visitors — and especially Mrs Cotter who made it such a memorable and meaningful week.

TELLING TALES OR ASKING FOR HELP PROJECT



This term, our Year 2 children were very fortunate to help pilot the Ariel Trust's brand-new Key Stage 1 resource: Telling Tales or Asking for Help. These special sessions explored how to ask for help in the best way, encouraging children to develop help-seeking behaviours from an early age. The aim is to protect children and equip them to deal with uncomfortable or potentially dangerous situations, such as bullying, online dangers and, in the future, even grooming.

The resource is being trialled and adapted based on feedback from schools during the spring and summer terms to ensure it is as effective and age-appropriate as possible. In our sessions, the story focused on bullying, helping the children learn when and how to ask for help, what language to use, and the difference between telling tales and seeking help. They also practised managing emotions, understanding the role of a bystander, and active listening.

The sessions were highly interactive, using games, freeze frames, roleplays and forum theatre to help children practise these important skills. As part of the project, three of our children were chosen to record voice-overs for the three main characters in the lesson scenario videos — and even Miss R got to join in as the teacher!

Well done to all the children for engaging so brilliantly with this important pilot and helping shape the final resource. A big well done to Grace, Olivia and Abel for your amazing acting skills!

KNIFE CRIME ASSSEMBLY AND WORKSHOP

We were really pleased to welcome Izzy into school recently to deliver an important assembly and workshop for our Year 5 and 6 pupils. The focus of the session was on making positive choices, with a particular emphasis on the sensitive topic of knife crime.

The workshop was carefully put together, using real-life scenarios to show both the positive and negative outcomes of different choices. This really helped the children to understand how their actions can have serious consequences in a way that felt relatable and meaningful.

The children were fully engaged throughout and left with lots to think about. It sparked some really thoughtful discussions and gave them confidence to make safer and more informed choices. Through interactive activities and open conversations, they explored how to handle difficult situations and make the right decisions.

A huge thank you to Izzy, who was fantastic. She was down-to-earth, approachable and really connected with the children. Her empathy and the way she made every child feel included made a big impression — even she commented on how engaged and mature the children were during the session!

OUT OF THE BLUE



The Bluecoat Out of the Blue project is an exciting and creative after-school experience for some of our Y4 and Y5 children. They children have been working with artists to explore a variety of art forms, including drawing, painting, and sculpture. The project has encouraged them to express themselves creatively and develop new artistic skills. Through engaging workshops and group activities, the children are learning how to communicate ideas and emotions through art. They have shown great enthusiasm and imagination throughout the sessions and this will continue into the new school year. The project will culminate in a special exhibition, where the children will proudly share their work with parents and the wider community.

ROBINWOOD RESIDENTIAL

Our recent residential trip to Robinwood was an unforgettable experience filled with adventure, teamwork, and personal growth. Over three action-packed days, some of our Year 5 and 6 children took part in a variety of exciting activities including canoeing, climbing, the giant swing, and the legendary Piranha Pool challenge. The staff at Robinwood were enthusiastic, supportive, and made everyone feel safe and encouraged. It was wonderful to see students challenge themselves, build confidence, and work together. The food was great, the accommodation was comfortable, and the memories made will last a lifetime. A huge thank you to everyone who helped make this trip such a success!







EYFS - PEOPLE WHO HELP US

This term, in the EYFS the main topic was 'People Who
Help Us', and they were lucky to have some exciting
visitors come and talk to the children about their roles in
the community.

- They welcomed officers from Merseyside Police, who let the children try on some police hats and explore their police car – the sirens were a big hit!
- The local fire brigade visited, giving everyone the chance to sit inside the fire engine and even have a go at using the big fire hose to spray water across the yard — what a memorable experience!

They also learned about how to look after their teeth with a visit from the community dentist, who demonstrated the best way to brush and explained why it's important to keep our smiles healthy!

Alongside their main topic, they also learned about 'Growing and Changing'. Miss Pia worked with the children to plant a variety of vegetables in our Early Years garden. The children loved getting their hands dirty planting seeds and watching the plants grow over the weeks. They are so proud of their little patch of garden, which is now full of life and colour.

KEY STAGE 2 ATHLETICS CLUB



This year, members of Year 3, 4, 5 and 6 took part in the Liverpool District Athletics Championships at Wavertree Track, making it our biggest turn out to date! All of these children have attended the school running club and competed in the Liverpool Cross Country competitions throughout the school year.

The girls and boys competed in the 75m sprint, 150m sprint and the mammoth 800m race. Annabel (Y6) also tried her hand at high jump and scored her personal best height!

We prepared the children during PE lessons in the Spring term with Coach Kate, as well as developing speed, stamina and sportsmanship during running club to ensure they approached these events with skill and determination.

Every child performed incredibly well in their events, and Miss Brie and Miss Spence were blown away by their team spirit and resilience. The children had a great time (as did the staff) and we even got to celebrate two of our own, Year 5's Tavenashe and Megan, getting 4th place in the 75m race and 4th in the 800m race respectively. This meant that Tave competed in the semi-final heat later that evening, and Megan attended the Liverpool Athletics' Championships on Monday 7th July, where she placed 7th!

Both children showed what being a true St Vincent pupil entails and we could not be prouder!

We could not have done this without the time and effort the parents and children put into running and athletics this year, so a huge thank you to all!

LIBRARY CLUB

This term we introduced our brand new 'Library Club' which is open to Years 2-6.

We have been fortunate enough to be enrolled on the National Literacy Trust's Libraries for Primaries initiative, which has allowed access to high quality staff training, as well as a gigantic selection of new books, including a Yoto player (audiobooks) and some additional furniture.

This has inspired a library refresh to take place ready for September, when we will raise the profile of reading for pleasure across the school. This is obviously a mammoth job, and so Miss Brie wanted to enlist the help of some of our pupils, in the form of Pupil Librarians.

The children wrote a letter of application for the role of pupil librarian, explaining their love of books and reading and how they would contribute positively to our school community. Those selected demonstrated great enthusiasm and thoughtful ideas for the role.

We then went on an amazing trip to Liverpool Central Library! This was a delightful morning, were the children found out the history of our magnificent city library, as well as what goes into being a good librarian. We even got to view some of the books in the archive, and saw a letter from an astronaut, as well as the most expensive book in the library (worth millions) and the tiniest book (a version of the Lords Prayer).

The children were so inquisitive and engaged during the session and really represented our school in the best light. We then returned back to school ready to implement some of the ideas we had learnt that day, as well as develop those key librarian skills such as organisation, independence and team work and social and communication skills. The librarians will continue their work during our after-school club next year, and will help St Vincent de Paul become a hub of book talk and reading for pleasure!
